## 1 WHY AUTONOMY ?

On the recommendation of the University Grants Commission and in concurrence with the State Government, the International College for Girls has been granted the autonomous status by the University of Rajasthan. In the wake of autonomy the college has the freedom:

- to determine and prescribe its own courses of study and syllabi and to restructure and redesign the courses to suit local needs.
- to evolve methods of assessment of student performance, to conduct examinations and to declare results.
- to use modern tools of educational technology in order to achieve greater creativity and excellence in higher education.
- to promote healthy practices such as community service, extension activities, projects for the benefit of the society.

## 2. GOVERNANCE OF THE AUTONOMOUS COLLEGE

The following Statutory bodies have been constituted, as per the guidelines of the University Grants Commission, to ensure proper functioning of the college :

- Board of Management
- Academic Council
- Boards of Studies
- Finance Committee

In addition to the above mentioned Statutory Bodies, certain committees such as Planning and Evaluation Committee, Grievances Appeal Committee, Examination Committee, Admission Committee, Student Welfare Committee, Committee for Co-curricular Activities, Standing Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Unfair Means Adjudication Committee, Result Committee, Library Committee and Academic Audit Committee, to name a few, have been strengthened to streamline various activities of the college.

## 3 PATTERN OF COURSES

The courses offered by the college leading to undergraduate and postgraduate degrees are **semester based**. There are two semesters in a year. The first semester called Autumn Semester or Odd Semester commences in the first week of July and continues till the end of November. The second semester called Spring or Even Semester commences in the second week of December and continues till the mid of May followed by Summer vacation. Each semester is of about 20 weeks duration inclusive of teaching work, CA Test and Semester End Examination.

Besides regular UG and PG programmes, the college also offers Career Oriented and Skill Development Courses, which are based on the annual pattern. A student has to compulsorily opt for any one Career Oriented, and Skill Development Course (leading to certificate) in the first year, besides the regular degree programme. In the subsequent years the Add-On Courses leading to Diploma and Advanced Diploma are optional.

## 4 COURSES OFFERED

The college may not start a course / subject if the number of candidates for that course / subject is less / not viable.

### 4.1 Career Oriented and Skill Development Courses (Add-on Courses)

The Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses have been designed to provide practical orientation and assist in shaping the career of the students according to their potential and talents. These are add-on in nature and can be pursued at three levels. Successful completion of the first level will pave the way for a smooth transition to the higher level. A Certificate holder will be eligible for the Diploma course and a Diploma holder for the Advanced Diploma.

#### 4.2 Business English Certificates (BEC)

Business English Certificates (BEC) is an International Examination designed by the University of Cambridge, ESOL (English for the Speakers of the Other Languages) to assess Business English Proficiency. The certificates are recognized by institutions and corporates world-wide. BEC is a qualification that is valid for life and can be added to one's resume. The British Council, India, in collaboration with the University of Cambridge, offers BEC at ICG. It is a suite of exams, i.e. Preliminary, Vantage & Higher, in conjunction with University of Cambridge, ESOL.

## 7. STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Each student admitted to ICG (autonomous) is enrolled with the University of Rajasthan. For this purpose enrollment forms are filled up at the time of admission. Students passing their qualifying examination from a Board other than the Board of Secondary Education Rajasthan or from a University other than the University of Rajasthan are also required to fill up the eligibility form and submit the same alongwith the migration certificate from their earlier Board/University. The admission of such students shall be confirmed only after their eligibility is decided by the University.

## 8. EXAMINATION FORMS AND EXAMINATION FEE

Students admitted to ICG (autonomous) are required to fill up their examination forms for each semester as per the schedule announced.

The duly filled examination forms should be deposited along with the prescribed examination fee.

## 9. UNIT BASED SYLLABI

The syllabi of all the papers included in various programmes have been divided into 5 units, with the number of lecture hours required to cover each unit specified against it. Each question paper of the Semester-End Examination is set to cover the entire syllabus.

## 10. EVALUATION SYSTEM

Evaluation for Semester Based Programmes is done through Continuous Assessment (C.A.) and Semester-End Examinations (S.E.E.). The relative weightage for the two types of evaluation is as given below:

The evaluation for the C.A. is internal and for the S.E.E. external. The above mentioned pattern is uniformly applicable to all Under-graduate and Post-graduate Programmes. The annual examination for the Career Oriented and Skill Development courses is conducted on the same pattern.

### 10.1 Continuous Assessment at U.G. Level

For UG classes the C.A. in theory papers is based on one test, one home assignment, class-room interaction and attendance, the relative weightage of which is as shown below:

The C.A. marks for the Projects and Seminars shall be awarded on the basis of the written reports, presentation and / or viva-voce of the students conducted at the Departmental level.

### 10.3 Test Papers

The test papers shall be set to include:

- Objective type- multiple choice questions.
- Short answer questions, problems based on case studies, numericals etc.
- Descriptive questions

The duly assessed test answer sheets are shown to the students.. The students can register their grievances, if any, to the teacher concerned, who will take appropriate measures to resolve the matter.

### 10.4 Verification of C.A. Marks

At the end of each semester, the consolidated CA marks statements are displayed on the Departmental Notice Board for verification by the students. Posting errors, if any, can be brought to the notice of the teacher concerned who will take the necessary action. After verification by the students, the marks are entered in the "Continuous Assessment Booklet" (Yellow Booklet) which the students are required to sign.

### 10.5 Semester-End Examinations

The Semester-End Examinations are held at the end of each semester according to the schedule issued by the examination department. The question papers of the Semester-End Examinations carry 70% of the total weightage.

### 10.6 Pattern of Question Paper for Semester-End Examinations

The question papers of Semester-End Examination contain various types of questions like Objective type- multiple choice questions, Short answer questions, problems based on case studies, numericals and descriptive questions covering the entire syllabi.

### 10.7 CODING OF ANSWER BOOKS

For assessment of Semester-End-Examination Answer Books, a system of coding is followed where each answer book is given a Fictitious Roll No. to ensure fair and just evaluation.

#### 10.8 EVALUATION OF ANSWER BOOKS

In the Semester-End Examination, each answer book is evaluated by two examiners. The average of marks awarded by the two examiners is taken as the marks obtained by the candidate. In case the difference between the two awards is more than 20 %, such an answer book is sent for evaluation to a third examiner and the average of the two closest awards out of three is taken as the final marks obtained by the candidate.

#### 10.9 SCRUTINY OF MARKS

The marks awarded by each examiner are scrutinized in order to eliminate any calculation and / or posting error.

#### 10.10 EVALUATION OF PRACTICALS

The Semester-End Practical examination are conducted by a panel of internal and external examiners. The students are examined and awarded marks in the practicals, as per the scheme of examination mentioned in the syllabi.

#### 10.11 EVALUATION OF PROJECT/SEMINAR

The evaluation of projects and seminars is based on the written reports, presentation and viva-voce. It is done by a panel of experts.

#### 10.12 EVALUATION OF CAREER ORIENTED AND SKILL DEVELOPMENT COURSES

These courses follow an annual pattern of examination which comprises Continuous Assessment and the Year-End Examination with the relative weightage of 30% and 70% respectively. The pattern for CA in these courses is similar to that of UG pass course in the semester scheme, as mentioned in section 10.1.

#### 10.13 GRIEVANCES OF THE STUDENTS

Grievances of the students regarding question papers, if any, are put up before the **Grievance Redressal Committee** which submits its recommendations after taking opinion of subject expert(s). Final decision is taken by the Principal/Director.

#### 11. CRITERIA FOR PASSING

In order to pass in a paper, a candidate must obtain at least 36 % marks individually in C.A. and Semester-End Examination of each paper, both at UG and PG level. It is essential to pass separately in each of the theory papers, practicals, projects, seminars or any other course component. A candidate is deemed to have failed in a C.A. and / or S.E.E. of a theory paper/practical/project/seminar, if the above conditions are not fulfilled. In Honours and Professional Programmes like BCA, BBA, BVA, B.Sc. Home Science, M.Sc. Home Science, MVA, MIB, MHRM, MSW, the pass percentage is 40 for C.A. and S.S.E. separately. However, in order to pass in Subsidiary and Foundation papers a candidate is required to obtain 36% marks individually in C.A. and S.E.E.

For the Career Oriented and Skill Development Programmes, a student is required to obtain at least 40% marks individually in C.A. and annual examination of each paper, so as to be declared pass in that paper. For the M.Phil. Programmes, pass percentage is 50 in CA and SEE separately.

A candidate is considered to have passed a course after she has cleared all the theory/practical papers, project, viva-voce etc., prescribed for that course in the syllabi.

#### 12. CREDIT WEIGHTED AVERAGE (CWA)

Credit weighted average (CWA) is worked out for each semester as well as for the complete course. When worked out for a Semester, it is called '**Semester Credit Weighted Average**' (SCWA in short) and for the complete course, it is called '**Cumulative Credit Weighted Average**' (CCWA in short). CCWA is worked out only when the candidate has passed all the theory papers, practicals, projects, seminars, core papers, foundation papers and any other components of the course, as prescribed in the syllabi and has earned the required minimum credits along with the credits prescribed for the Co-Curricular Activities.

CWA is an index for comparing relative performance of the students in a course and is worked out by using the following formula:

$$CWA = \frac{\sum \text{credits} \times \text{marks obtained}}{\text{Total credits}}$$

where  $\sum$  represents summation over the theory/practical papers, project, seminar etc., to which credits are assigned. However, the credits assigned to the Co-Curricular Activities are not taken into account while working out CWA.

SCWA and CCWA are awarded separately for Foundation Courses and Electives in the UG pass and Professional Courses. Similarly in an Honours programme, SCWA and CCWA are awarded separately for the Foundation Courses and Major and Subsidiary papers taken together. In P.G. programmes, all the theory papers, practicals, project, dissertation, seminar etc. are considered for working out SCWA and CCWA.

### 13. AWARD OF CLASS / DIVISION

Class or Division is based on CCWA obtained by the candidate and is awarded only on the completion of the course according to the following criteria :

Class / Division is awarded separately in the Foundation Courses and Electives in UG pass and Professional Courses. Similarly, in an Honours Programme, separate class/division is awarded for Foundation Courses and Major and Subsidiary papers taken together. At P.G. and M.Phil. levels, all the components of study are considered together for the award of class/division.

### 14. DECLARATION OF RESULT

The results are declared by the Controller of Examinations, after being approved by the Result Committee. The roll numbers of successful candidates are displayed on the College notice board and published in the newspapers. The details of marks obtained by the student are also made available on the college website.

### 15. TRANSCRIPTS, MIGRATION AND PROVISIONAL CERTIFICATES

The transcripts are issued by the college while the Migration and Provisional Certificates are issued by the University of Rajasthan.

**16. CONSOLIDATED MARK SHEETS**

On successful completion of a Programme, a consolidated mark sheet is issued by the college, which contains the marks obtained and credits earned by the candidate in different theory/practical papers, projects/seminar throughout the programme, along with CCWA, Cumulative percentage of marks, and class / division obtained by her.

**17.. AWARD OF DEGREES**

The Degrees to the successful candidates shall be awarded by the University of Rajasthan on the recommendation of the College.

**18. MERIT POSITIONS**

A maximum of ten merit positions shall be declared by the college from amongst the successful candidates passing all the prescribed papers in a course, in the first attempt. At UG level subject-wise merit positions shall also be declared by the college.

**19. ATTENDANCE**

For being eligible to appear in the Semester-End Examination, it will be necessary for a candidate to have attended a minimum of 75% of the total classes held in that Semester. There shall be a provision of duty leaves for participation in games and sports, NCC/NSS, cultural and other Co-Curricular or Academic Activities so as to enable the participants to fulfill the minimum requirement of attendance.

**20. RULES FOR PROMOTION**

The students admitted to Odd Semesters (I, III, V of UG level or I/III of PG level) of all programmes except M.Phil. shall be automatically promoted to the next semester irrespective of their result in these semesters. Thus there is no check on promotion from an Odd Semester to the next Even Semester. However, at the end of an Even Semester, the year long performance of a candidate shall be taken into account for promotion to the next odd semester.

**21.. PROMOTION IN U.G. PASS COURSE**

At the UG level (pass course), the performance of a candidate in only three electives shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of promotion to the next semester. Total credits assigned to the three electives in a semester are  $3 \times 8 = 24$ . Therefore, out of a total of 48 credits assigned to the electives in the two semesters (I and II), a candidate must earn at least 20 credits for promotion to the next semester ( i.e., III semester). Similarly for promotion to V Semester a candidate must earn at least 20 credits in the three electives during the III and IV Semesters. The credits earned in the Foundation Courses and in Co-Curricular Activities are not considered for the purpose of promotion. However, for the award of degree, it is necessary that a candidate must qualify and earn minimum required credits in the Foundation Courses and the Co-Curricular Activities, failing which the degree shall not be awarded.

**21.1 Promotion in Honours Programmes**

In Honours programme, Major subject carry 16 credits and the Subsidiary 8 credits, which totals to 24 credits in a semester. Thus out of 48 credits assigned to the Major and Subsidiary in two semesters, a candidate must earn at least 20 credits in the two semesters taken together for promotion to the next Semester. The credits of Foundation Courses and Co-Curricular Activities are not be taken in to account for the purpose of promotion.

**21.2 Promotion in Professional Courses**

In Professional Courses like B.Sc. Home Sc., M.Sc. Home Science, B.B.M., B.V.A., M.V.A., B.C.A., M.I.B., M.H.R.M., M.S.W. for promotion to the next Odd Semester a candidate must earn at least 50% of the total credits assigned to the preceding two semesters. Credits assigned to the Foundation Courses and Co-Curricular Activities will not be considered for the purpose of promotion.

**21.3 Promotion in P.G. Courses**

In PG courses, a candidate must earn at least 50% of the total credits assigned to the papers prescribed in the First and Second Semesters, taken together, for promotion to the Third Semester.

**21.4 Promotion in M.Phil. Courses**

In M.Phil. courses, a candidate must earn at least 50% of the total credits assigned to the papers prescribed in the First Semester for promotion to the Second Semester.

**21.5 Provision for Unsuccessful Candidates**

A candidate who is not eligible for promotion to the III or V Semester, as the case may be, will be allowed to appear in subsequent examinations as an ex-student so as to qualify more papers and earn more credits in the immediately following year. After fulfilling the necessary criterion for promotion, such students would be re-admitted and promoted to the next semester, as and when the relevant semester course is being run at the college.

**22. DUE PAPERS**

If a student does not pass in all the courses/papers prescribed in a Semester, yet, she earns the minimum credits required for promotion, she is promoted to the next semester and the papers in which she has failed are treated as "due papers". The candidate is required to appear in the due papers along with the papers of the next semester, provided that the examination of the due papers of an odd semester is held in an odd semester only and the examination of the due papers of an even semester is held in an even semester only. In M.Phil. programmes, a candidate can appear in the examination of her due paper(s) from the First Semester along with the papers of Second Semester.

In case of due papers, the candidate is examined in the Semester-End Examination only and the CA marks obtained by her in the earlier semester(s) will be taken into account. However, if a candidate fails in C.A. she will be permitted to appear in C.A. of the due papers.

In Career Oriented and Skill Development (Certificate / Diploma / Advanced Diploma) courses, a candidate failing in only one paper may take it as due paper in the immediately following year otherwise she will be required to appear in all the papers of Theory and Practical.

**23. IMPROVEMENT**

The students of PG. programmes would be permitted to improve their performance in a maximum of 50% of the theory papers in the immediately following year. In such cases, CA marks already earned by a candidate in the previous year would be taken into consideration. The candidate would be allowed to sit in the Semester-End Examination for improvement along with her papers of the **current semester or otherwise**. The new marks would be taken into consideration only if she improves her performance. No such provision for improvement of performance exists at U.G. level.

**24. MAXIMUM TIME LIMIT**

Under autonomy the college provides flexibility of time limit for different courses. Starting from the time of admission, the time limit for different programmes is as given below :

- i) UG pass course- 12 semesters (6 years)
- ii) Honours Programme- 12 semesters (6 years)
- iii) UG level Professional courses- 12 semesters (6 years)  
(B.Sc. H.Sc., B.C.A., B.B.M., B.V.A.)
- iv) B.V.A.- 16 semesters (8 years)
- v) PG - 8 semesters (4 years)
- vi) M.Phil. - 6 Semesters (3 years)

**25. SPECIAL SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMINATION**

In the Semester System, a candidate is allowed to take her due papers along with the papers of the next semester. Hence, there is no provision for any supplementary examination. However, special supplementary examination will be held for the final year students in the month of June/July.

**26. REVALUATION /SCRUTINY**

Since each answer book is evaluated and scrutinized by two examiners there is no provision for scrutiny / revaluation of answer books in the system followed by the College.

**27.. UNFAIR MEANS CASES**

If a candidate is found using unfair means or indulging in disorderly conduct during the C.A. tests or Semester–End Examination, a case of unfair means will be registered against her and placed before the Unfair Means Adjudication Committee, constituted by the Academic Council. The committee will examine these cases with the help of subject experts and recommend suitable action to the Principal / Director for a final decision on the matter.

**28. SCHOLARSHIPS, AWARDS AND MEDALS**

Students excelling in academics, co-curricular & extra curricular activities are felicitated through various awards and scholarships instituted by the college. The college may also recommend the names of meritorious students for scholarships under the various schemes of the State and Central Governments.
